Highlights from the November Meeting:

Meeting called to order via Zoom at 7:30 pm by club president David Spoelstra, N9KT. There were 24 in attendance. Announcements: The Indy United ARC, W9SU (combined with the W9RCA club) placed very well in Field Day! Indy United not only won Class 3A this year but also had the highest score across North America in 2020.

Election of Officers and Board of Directors of the club will be held at the December meeting.

The presentation at the December meeting will be by Bob Heil, K9EID, from Heil Sound and the Ham Nation podcast.

New Members: Nathan, KD9QHF, new Extra. Nathan has a background in electronics and computers, running his computer consulting business from his home.

Dave Gingrich, K9DC, introduced this evening's speaker, Steve Herman, W7VOA, from the Voice of America. Steve is originally from Cincinnati. He and Dave met on IRLP. Steve set up the first IRLP node in Japan.

He got the radio "bug" from his grandfather and was a Short Wave Listener. Getting on the air helped defeat Steve's shyness, and helped with voice training.

Steve showed the first page of his first log from 1972. He still keeps a paper log. He got a first class radiotelephone license (commercial) in order to be qualified to operate a sound board at a 50 KW station, but never needed that license.

He has lived all over the world., and has held 11 foreign amateur licenses. He showed a photo of where he "Modeled" with a couple of Yaesu rigs in Japan, but unfortunately didn't get to keep any of the radios he was shown with.

He had lots of interesting pictures from all over the world, and his operating experiences, including some from Afghanistan. He never has been able to operate aeronautical mobile from Air Force 1, but says maybe someday....

When asked about Air Force 1, he said one rule of thumb was that he had to be able to get his gear up and going on short order even during long flights. He said the food on AF1 food was always pretty good. The Taco bowl was always his favorite! Trivia: M&Ms were introduced on board AF1 by Nancy Reagan when smoking was banned on the plane.

Steve said the White House Press pool rotates among networks, so VOA would travel on every sixth or seventh trip.

His first WH post was with the Trump administration, but he has been on many trips with other administrations, and other offices.

There were lots of good questions from those on line.

The VOA is headquartered in the Cohen Federal Building in Washington, D.C. Steve recommended anyone who hasn't been to the VOA museum in suburban Cincinnati to check it out. Steve considers Bhutan to be the best country for tourists.

He offered to make an in person presentation to the club after COVID. The meeting adjourned at 8:45 p.m.

Ham Radio News:

ARRL SEEKS WAIVER OF PROPOSED FCC AMATEUR APPLICATION FEES

ARRL has urged the FCC to waive its proposed \$50 amateur radio application fee. The Commission proposal was made last month in a Notice of Proposed Rulemaking (NPRM) in MD 20-270. The proposal already has drawn more than 3,200 individual comments overwhelmingly opposed to the plan. The fees, directed by Congress and imposed on all FCC-regulated services, are to recover the FCC's costs of handling and processing applications.

"Amateur radio applications were not listed when the Congress adopted its 1985 fee schedule for applications, and therefore amateur license applications were excluded from the collection of fees," ARRL said on November 16 in its formal comments on the proposal. "Similarly, a decade later when regulatory fees were authorized, the Amateur Service was excluded, except for the costs associated with issuing vanity call signs." The new statutory provisions are similar. Amateur radio license applications are not addressed in the application fees section and explicitly excluded from regulatory fees," ARRL said, and there is "no evidence of any intent by Congress to change the exempt status of amateur applications and instead subject them to new fees."

ARECIBO RADIO TELESCOPE DEEMED BEYOND REPAIR

The damaged 305-meter radio telescope at Arecibo Observatory in Puerto Rico will be decommissioned due to safety concerns, the National Science Foundation (NSF) announced on November 19. The iconic dish has served as a backdrop for several science fiction movies. The Arecibo Observatory Amateur Radio Club, KP4AO, is headquartered at the research facility, and several radio amateurs are employed there.

“Following a review of engineering assessments that found damage to the Arecibo Observatory cannot be stabilized without risk to construction workers and staff at the facility, the US National Science Foundation will begin plans to decommission the 305-meter telescope, which for 57 years has served as a world-class resource for radio astronomy, planetary, solar system, and geospace research,” the NSF said. “The decision comes after NSF evaluated multiple assessments by independent engineering companies that found the telescope structure is in danger of a catastrophic failure, and its cables may no longer be capable of carrying the loads they were designed to support.”

Signals from the Past:

From the October 1960 *Amachewer*:

A very interesting program on TV cameras and tape machines was put on Friday, October 14th by Mr. Robert Brockway, chief engineer of WFBM-TV.

Color cameras have 3 tubes, one for each of the primary colors: Red, Green and Blue. The primary colors could be any three as long as any two do not make the third color. Equal amounts of each primary give white. There are complex systems for separating the three colors which are made of reflecting filters.

Mr. Brockway also explained the new tape machines which use 2" wide tape and has frequency response to about 5 Mc. The tape machine consists of 6 relay racks at a total investment of about \$150,000. It contains 315 tubes plus about 100 diodes.
