



Rinehart, K9RU. Voting was accomplished by a “show of hand emojis” on Zoom, with the slate of officers being voted in by acclamation.

Next, David introduced our speaker for the evening, Steve Herman, W7VOA. Steve’s presentation was titled “VOA: The Long Path from Shortwave”. VOA has 14 TV and over 40 radio studios in the US, serving more than 40 language services. Among other things, VOA covers news from the US. Steve said the VOA has its own fact checking site: <https://www.polygraph.info/> VOA is mandated by law to be fair and factual in its reporting. Steve said that over the years, the shortwave presence of VOA has reduced significantly, but it still has a significant amount of programming available in multiple languages on shortwave. A listing of frequencies, languages, and schedules can be found at <https://www.short-wave.info/?station=voice%20of%20america> VOA currently partners with local broadcasters around the world. A map showing VOA’s current coverage is available at <https://www.voanews.com/a/voa-around-the-world/4113370.html> VOA’s web site, <https://www.voanews.com/> offers an unbiased view of the news from the US, as well as the rest of the world. Steve noted that there is a “firewall” that prevents the government from interfering with the message of VOA. The Smith-Mundt Act of 1948 laid the groundwork for the VOA.

At this point, Steve took questions. Mike Sercher, WA9FDO, asked about how VOA gets into Russia. Steve said that the internet in Russia is relatively un-censored, compared to China, for instance. Jim Brown, W0RLD, asked about how the cancellation of visas in the Trump administration affected VOA foreign correspondents. Steve said it was difficult, but they managed since it was fairly late in that administration’s tenure. Dave Gingrich, K9DC, asked about Twitter since Elon Musk’s purchase. Steve said he still is active on Twitter (@W7VOA), and said although there hasn’t been any directive from VOA, NPR had advised their correspondents to NOT close their accounts. Steve said there was speculation that there may be a massive “melt-down” of Twitter due to lay-offs in the technical side. WA9FDO noted VOA was formed the same year as Armed Forces Radio, but Steve said there was no connection between the two that he knew. Jim Rinehart, K9RU, asked if VOA picked up any folks from independent Russian broadcasters after the crackdown by Putin. Steve didn’t know for sure, but wouldn’t doubt it. Jim also asked if Steve works from his home studio now. Steve said that the current policy from VOA is they must be in the field or the office at least once during each pay period. Steve was also asked how much freedom they have to produce their stories as they like. He implied that he hasn’t been affected by any “censorship”. K9DC asked about hams involved in VOA. Steve said there are 12 to 15 in the VOA club (<https://www.qsl.net/k3voa/>), and said most of the hams at VOA are in engineering. David Spoelstra, N9KT, asked if VOA uses any Artificial Intelligence (AI) writer

services. Steve said they did not, to his knowledge. In closing, Steve said he is active on IRLP reflector 9202, and HF. The meeting adjourned around 9:00.

### **SUPPORT THE IRC VIA YOUR ARRL DUES**

For many years, the ARRL has had a “Club Commission Program”, where a portion of any ARRL dues that were paid through a local ARRL affiliated club (such as the Indianapolis Radio Club) could be “kicked back” to that club. Recently, the ARRL has made this program more attractive to clubs, and easier to administer for the clubs. Under the updated program, local clubs can earn \$5 per regular membership renewal, or \$15 per new membership. Only REGULAR memberships are eligible for this program. Life, Family, International, Blind, and Student memberships do not earn a commission. Multi-year renewals only earn one commission. If you’re not currently a member of the ARRL (or haven’t been a member for at least two years), now would be a great time to join! You can download and complete [this form](#), and turn it in at the next club meeting, along with payment. If you want to pay by cash (\$49) at a meeting, that is fine, and the club will send a check on your behalf to the ARRL. I will have a few of the forms with me at club meetings.
